COURSE GUIDELINES & EXPECTATIONS

This course is held entirely on D2L through the Camosun portal http://online.camosun.ca. This course syllabus is found inside the course shell where there is also a link to the textbook, quizzes and exams and course content.

When starting the course it is important to begin with the *Start Here* link inside content of the D2L course and follow chronologically from week 1 to the end of the course. Specific links to Activities are found there along with links to lecture notes and accompanying audio podcasts of the lectures. There are also links to the **Quizzes** and **Activity** (Assignment) drop boxes inside D2l along with a link to the discussion board where posts for the activities will be made along with **Discussion** of other student's posts.

While we will be following along with the chapters of the textbook, as indicated on the attached syllabus, the lecture topics may stray from the material covered in the weekly readings. The exams will be based upon both the readings and the lecture material.

Evaluation: There will be two exams: a Midterm, and a Final Exam; both of which will be based upon the material covered in the textbook and the online lectures, assigned readings, and activities. These tests will involve various multiple-choice and short answer questions and will be completed through d2l. These are CLOSED BOOK exams and as such there will be a limited amount of time for these exams, so be sure to do the practice quizzes to prepare yourself for these larger ones.

The Midterm exam will be on the date indicated on the course syllabus and the **Final exam** will be during the first week of regular final exam period.

There will also be several regular online practice quizzes and weekly activities as well as ongoing discussion board activity, as part of their course work.

Online Practice Quizzes: There will be a collection of practice quizzes found through d2l - locatable through each section of contents or through quizzes. To get marks for the quizzes you simply need to complete one per chapter. You may take these quizzes up to three times, your highest score will count. Quizzes for the first half of the course must be completed by the midterm exam date, and students who complete these quizzes after that date will not be given credit for them. Quizzes for the second half of the course must be completed by the final exam date and students completing these quizzes after that date will not be given credit for them. It is recommended that each quiz be taken once during the week of the specific topic for that quiz and the other attempts may be take as practice in preparation for the midterm or the final exam.

Weekly Activities:

Various activities will be assigned throughout the semester. Here students will be expected to complete the activities by the posted deadline, making sure that they have been submitted to the drop box for that given activity. Late assignments will be given a penalty.

The activities will follow the course lecture material and will involve students making observations, conducting interviews, providing critical thoughts, reflections, and comments on their own specific topics as well as discuss with others in the class. Most activities will involve making a posting to the discussion board as well as commenting on the postings of other students. The goal here is the both generate experience and understanding as well as to enhance the on-line learning community. **Half of the marks will be given for the discussion board post and half for the assignment posted to the drop box**.

As such the **Discussion board activity** will involve commenting on the activity postings of others as well as general discussion of the course materials. *It is important that you make a reply to someone else's posting for each activity in order to garner these activity points*. This is for an additional 10% towards your grade. It is expected that the discussion replies will be made within two weeks of the topic being covered, otherwise they will be considered to be late and will not be graded.
